Helping your child learn at home in

Mathematics



In the street

- Looking at bus numbers
- Matching objects cars/doors
- Shapes around pavement, windows, doors, wheels
- Find a number 3
- Comparing door numbers
- Counting lampposts, red cars
- Talk about big and small
- Can you bring me 3 leaves?
- Collect objects leaves, pebbles, twigs Who has more?
- Talk about distance near, far count steps or jumps, race to next lamppost. Who was the fastest?

Doing the washing

- Sorting by colour and size.
- Counting/Matching/pairing up socks.
- Find four items that are different sizes
- Can you put them in order?



- Count 5 items into the machine
- Finding the number on the dial
- Making piles biggest, smallest, most, least



<u>Time</u>

- What day is it today, tomorrow?
- What day was it yesterday?
- Use timers, phones and clocks to measure short periods of time.
- Count down 5/10 seconds to get to the table/ into bed etc.
- Recognising numbers on the clock.
- Make your own sand timer plastic bottle put sand in make a hole in lid see how many claps jumps can be done before the bottle empties.



Measuring

- Are you taller than a ...?
- Marking height on the wall.
- Cut hand shapes out of paper. How many hands long is the couch? How long is the table? Which is longer?
- Who has the biggest hands in our family?
- How many steps from the gate to

the front door?

- Ordering teddies/dolls/toys smallest to biggest
- Filling and emptying bottles, cups, jugs in the bath



Going shopping

- Reading price tags
- Counting items into the basket
- Finding and counting coins
- Comparing weights which is heavier
- Comparing and ordering sizes
- Look for shapes



Food!

- Can you cut your toast into 4 pieces? Can you cut it into triangles?
- Setting the table.

 Counting the right number of plates etc. How many more do we need? One straw in each glass
- Count how many fish fingers, one less after eating one
 How many now?
- Can you cutlery in the right place in the drawers?
- Helping with the cooking by measuring and counting ingredients.
- Putting one cake case in each section of the baking tray. How many more do we need?
- Setting the timer.
- Collect plastic trays from fruit/veg and egg boxes for sorting beads buttons

Then make.....

Playdough

Here's a simple recipe:

1 cup of plain flour

1 cup of water

1 tablespoon cooking oil

2 teaspoons cream of tartar

Half a cup of salt

food colouring and essences (optional)

Put all ingredients in a large saucepan,

and heat slowly, stirring all the time until it forms a ball. Keep it wrapped in clingfilm or in a covered tub to stop it drying out.

Then Use your dough to:

- Make numerals and shapes
- Sort shapes into groups, or order by size count them
- Make long and short; thick and thin wiggly snakes.
- Adding small groups/simple taking away

 Use words like big, bigger, biggest, small, smaller, smallest, more, less, most, least,

<u>Shapes</u>

- Use objects found around the home to learn about shapes. Recycling items like boxes and bottles can be used to make anything - robots, instruments talk about the sides and edges - round, straight, flat, curved, points, corners
- Cut a potato into shapes (circles, triangle etc). Use with paint to make pictures and patterns.
- Cut out shapes from coloured paper/ newspaper and arrange into pictures.

 Shape hunt: Can you find a square in your house (windows etc), a circle ...cubes, cylinders, cuboids can be found in the kitchen cupboards ©

Games

- Putting cards into piles
- Jigsaws (you can make your own by cutting up a magazine picture)
- Snap (matching pairs) or Happy Families (collect 4 of a kind)
- Snakes and ladders or other simple dice games.
- Adding numbers on two dice.
- Bingo, with numbers or shapes
- Dominoes
- Building with bricks and towers
- Scoring games make skittles with empty bottles/ throwing beanbags into targets

5 little monkeys jumping on the bed

One, two, three, four, five. Once I caught a fish alive.

This little piggy went to market

Two little dickey birds

Five little speckled frogs

Five currant buns in a baker's shop
